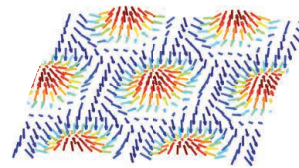

mammals) must learn when and where to migrate, and reintroduced populations of bighorn sheep and moose demonstrate that this knowledge is passed across generations.
